## Constitutional Position and Powers of the Prime Minister

The Constitution of India establishes a parliamentary system where the President is the Head of State, but the Prime Minister is the Head of Government. Article 74(1) states that there shall be a Council of Ministers with the Prime Minister at the head to aid and advise the President, who shall, in the exercise

of his functions, act in accordance with such advice. This provision effectively makes the Prime Minister the real executive authority.

Article 75 outlines further aspects of the Prime Minister's appointment and relationship with the Council of Ministers. The President appoints the Prime Minister, and other ministers are appointed by the President on the Prime Minister's advice. The Council of Ministers is collectively responsible to the House of the People (Lok Sabha). This means the Prime Minister must command the confidence of the majority in the Lok Sabha.

The powers and functions of the Prime Minister are extensive and multifaceted:

### **As Head of Government**

The Prime Minister is the chief spokesperson of the Union Government. All major policy announcements, whether domestic or foreign, are often made by or attributed to the Prime Minister. This includes setting the legislative agenda for Parliament.

### **Head of the Council of Ministers**

The Prime Minister selects and dismisses ministers. They allocate portfolios among ministers and preside over cabinet meetings. The Prime Minister guides, directs, controls, and coordinates the activities of all ministers. The resignation or death of the Prime Minister automatically dissolves the Council of Ministers. ### **Link between the President and the Cabinet**

The Prime Minister is the chief channel of communication between the President and the Council of Ministers (Article 78). The Prime Minister conveys all decisions of the Council of Ministers relating to the administration of the affairs of the Union and proposals for legislation to the President.

### **Leader of Parliament**

The Prime Minister is the leader of the Lok Sabha (if a member of it) and is responsible for maintaining discipline within the ruling party. They are the chief government spokesman in Parliament, answering questions and defending policies.

### **Chief Advisor to the President**

The Prime Minister advises the President regarding the appointment of important officials like the Attorney General, Comptroller and Auditor General, Chairman and members of UPSC, Election Commissioners, and ambassadors to other countries.

### **Crisis Manager-in-Chief**

During emergencies, whether internal or external, the Prime Minister plays a crucial role in coordinating the response and providing leadership. This includes natural disasters, economic crises, or national security threats.

## Foreign Policy Architect

The Prime Minister plays a significant role in shaping India's foreign policy, representing the nation at international forums and negotiating treaties. Their personal diplomacy often impacts bilateral and multilateral relations.

The Prime Minister's position is thus central to India's governance, requiring strong leadership, political acumen, and administrative skill to effectively manage the complex affairs of a diverse nation.

## Prime Ministers of India: Chronological List and Key Contributions

Their primary role is to oversee the day-to-day administration and ensure continuity of government until a new government is formed after elections. Crucially, a caretaker PM does **not** have the mandate to make major policy decisions, enter into significant international agreements, or introduce new legislation. Their powers are generally limited to routine administrative functions, maintaining the status quo, and facilitating the transition to the next elected government. The constitutional position, however, remains that of a Prime Minister, but their functional authority is constrained by convention and the lack of a fresh mandate.
