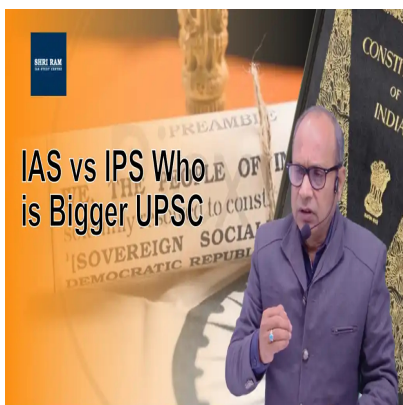




IAS vs IPS Who is Bigger UPSC

They are the custodians of public funds and resources, ensuring accountability and efficiency in governance. Role of an IPS Officer

An IPS officer's responsibilities are primarily centered around the maintenance of law and order, public safety, and crime prevention within their jurisdiction. Their role is specialized, focusing on the operational aspects of policing and security.

At the district level, an IPS officer serves as the Superintendent of Police (SP) or Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP). In this capacity, they are the head of the district police force, responsible for crime detection, investigation, and prosecution, as well as the overall management and discipline of their personnel. Key Differences between IAS and IPS

Their career path remains focused on policing and security administration.

Training Focus

The training curriculum for IAS officers at the Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration (LBSNAA) focuses on public administration, economics, law, policy analysis, and management techniques relevant to diverse administrative roles. It emphasizes a generalist approach to governance.

IPS training at the Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel National Police Academy (SVPNPA) concentrates on criminology, forensic science, police administration, law enforcement, investigation techniques, internal security, physical fitness, and combat skills. The training is highly specialized and physically demanding, preparing officers for the rigors of police work.

IAS vs IPS: Addressing the 'Who is Bigger' Question

The perception of the IAS being 'bigger' is largely a consequence of its generalist nature, the comprehensive administrative and magisterial powers vested in it, and its coordinating role over various government departments, including the police, at the district level.
