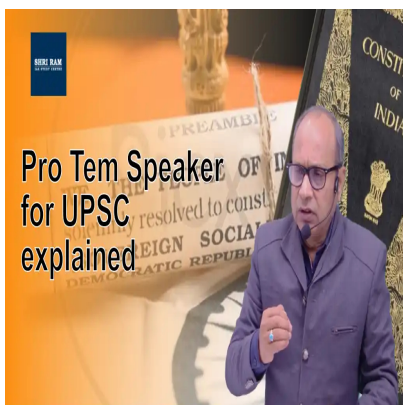




Pro Tem Speaker for UPSC explained

Description

India's parliamentary democracy operates on well-defined procedures and [constitutional provisions](#) to ensure continuity and smooth functioning, especially after a general election. The formation of a new Lok Sabha marks a crucial period, necessitating the election of its presiding officers – the Speaker and the Deputy Speaker. However, before these permanent offices are filled, a temporary arrangement is required to administer the oath to the newly elected members and to oversee the election process of the permanent Speaker.

The term 'Pro Tem' is derived from Latin, meaning 'for the time being'. Consequently, a Pro Tem Speaker refers to a temporary Speaker appointed for a specific, limited period and purpose. This individual is not the regular, elected Speaker of the Lok Sabha but rather a stop-gap arrangement to manage the initial affairs of a newly elected House. The Pro Tem Speaker is a member of the Lok Sabha itself, usually chosen based on a well-established convention.

The primary characteristic of this office is its transient nature. The Pro Tem Speaker's tenure is brief, concluding as soon as the permanent Speaker is elected by the Lok Sabha. This ensures that while there is a presiding officer to conduct essential initial business, the House quickly moves to elect its full-

time leader who will guide its proceedings for the duration of its term. The role is procedural and administrative, focused on enabling the House to become fully functional.

The appointment of a Pro Tem Speaker is a customary practice in parliamentary systems, designed to address the vacuum that arises when the office of the Speaker becomes vacant immediately before the first meeting of a new legislative body. This mechanism prevents any procedural paralysis and upholds the principle of continuous legislative oversight.

Circumstances for Pro Tem Speaker Appointment

The appointment of a Pro Tem Speaker is a specific procedural step that occurs under particular circumstances, primarily linked to the lifecycle of the Lok Sabha. The most common and significant situation for the appointment of a Pro Tem Speaker is after a general election, when a new Lok Sabha has been constituted.

Upon the dissolution of the previous Lok Sabha, the office of the Speaker immediately becomes vacant. When the new Lok Sabha is formed following the election results, it convenes for its first session. At this stage, there is no elected Speaker to preside over the proceedings or administer the oath of affirmation to the newly elected Members of Parliament (MPs). How Pro Tem Speaker is Appointed and Their Duties

The President of India appoints the Pro Tem Speaker. This appointment is made before the first sitting of the newly constituted Lok Sabha. These duties ensure that the new Lok Sabha can formally begin its legislative journey, culminating in the election of its regular presiding officer. The role is fundamentally procedural, designed to establish the foundational structure of the House.

Constitutional Provision for Pro Tem Speaker

While the [Constitution of India](#) does not explicitly mention the term 'Pro Tem Speaker', the basis for this office is derived from constitutional provisions and well-established parliamentary conventions. The relevant articles primarily deal with the vacancy of the Speaker's office and the performance of its duties.

Article 94 states that whenever the Lok Sabha is dissolved, the Speaker shall not vacate his office until immediately before the first meeting of the Lok Sabha after the dissolution. This implies that the Speaker's office becomes vacant just as the new Lok Sabha is about to convene.

Article 95(1) is particularly relevant. The reliance on convention for the selection (senior-most member) complements the constitutional power of appointment.

Powers of the Pro Tem Speaker

The powers of the Pro Tem Speaker are similar to those of the permanent Speaker, but they are exercised for a very limited duration and primarily for specific, initial purposes. The Pro Tem Speaker holds all the powers of the Speaker under the Constitution and the Rules of Procedure for the period they preside over the House. However, in practice, these powers are exercised judiciously and solely for the functions they are appointed to perform.

The key powers include:

1. **Administering Oath:** The power to administer the oath or affirmation to newly elected members is a significant function. Without this, members cannot legally take their seats or participate in House proceedings.

4. **Casting Vote:** Like the permanent Speaker, the Pro Tem Speaker does not vote in the first instance. However, in the event of a tie during any procedural vote (though unlikely given their limited functions), they would have a casting vote to break the deadlock.
5. **Adjournment of the House:** The Pro Tem Speaker has the power to adjourn the House or suspend its sitting.
